Costume/Prop Suggestions

Children should wear a variety of brightly colored clothes, such as shorts, overalls, and so on. Obtain Mickey Mouse ears for each to wear on their heads.

Set Suggestions

Cover the stage with Disney posters and pictures. Be sure to include pictures of the songs/characters found in the program. Draw large mouse ears to place on the back wall. On the ears write the words "Disney Favorites."

Script Begins

(Please note: This script is created for a small cast but can be expanded to fit any number of children you would like to use.)

(The five narrators enter together and position themselves across the stage.)

Narrator 1: Ladies and gentlemen, welcome to our show.
